Warmest greetings from the Horizons Children's Project! We are a Canadian-Ghanaian partnership that supports abandoned and destitute children in Sandema, a rural town in Ghana. Just three years ago, many of the children currently under our care were living life on the streets of Sandema. Now, they are enrolled in school and participating in a dynamic household. Our mission is to equip these needy children with the education and skills they need to reach their fullest potentials.

Since our last newsletter, we have welcomed another 6 children into the Horizons home. This brings our total number of boys up to 26! With so many children living communally, you can imagine how chaotic life can be at the home. It is a testimony to the wonderful work of our Coordinator, Simon Akoba, and the House Mother, Judith Adum, who dedicate themselves wholeheartedly to the smooth running of day-to-day activities at the house.

This summer, I'll be returning to Sandema to spend a couple of months with the children, Simon and our volunteer Board of Advisors. We will put our heads together to develop some plans for expanding our current program. Some areas we will explore include 1) purchasing computers for the home to provide skill-building opportunities for the children, and 2) developing a small business initiative that the children can run in order to enhance their skills and increase the home's sustainability. In the meantime, we are seeking feedback and ideas from everyone and anyone, so if you have any insights, please feel free to contact us!

### Our Growing Family






Left: Bunkbeds have enabled us to maximize on space in our relatively small home. And of course, sharing a room with 12 boys means plenty of opportunities for kidding around!


Boys work in teams of two to do their weekly household chores. Right: Daniel and Awudu feed some hungry chickens.
